With approximately \$250 million in assets, TGKVF is the largest community foundation in Central Appalachia and among the largest community foundations in the United States. TGKVF funds initiatives in education, health, community economic development, basic needs, and social services, granting more than \$10.0 million annually to initiatives that benefit thousands of individuals.

Before joining TGKVF, Michelle was the CEO of the Kanawha Institute for Social Entrepreneurship, Inc. (KISRA), a community-based, non-profit organization that serves West Virginia families through health, employment, asset development, and job training initiatives. Over the past 20 years, Michelle's work has been recognized locally and nationally. She has received the Living the Dream Award from the WV Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Foundation; a Mission Award from Union Mission (2016); Civil Rights Day Award from the WV State Office of the Governor (2015); Dr. Martin Luther King, Humanitarian Award from the WV Material Association (2015); Fatherhood Champion of Change recognition from President Obama and the White House (2012); National Association of University Women, Charleston Branch Award (2012); Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., Theta Psi Chapter, Citizen of the Year (2012); Governor's Award for Community Service (2011); U.S. Small Business Administration, Entrepreneurship Champion (2009); and West Virginia State University, President's Award for Community Service (2009).

Michelle has a life of community service and is actively engaged with several organizations in the West Virginia Appalachian region. She is a member of the Charleston Rotary. In the philanthropy sector, she is a philanthropy West Virginia board member, Appalachia Funders Network steering committee member, and a founding member of African American Philanthropy in Action (a giving circle). She has served as the Minister of Administration of Ferguson Memorial Baptist Church since 2009 and as a member of the Charleston-Institute Chapter of the Links, Incorporated, since 2011. Scholarship – Significant Contributions in the area of Education Excellence

Dr. Jerome A. Gilbert

Marshall University—Huntington, WV

“Jerry” Gilbert became the 37th President of Marshall University in January 2016. He is a graduate of Marshall University with a background in biomedical engineering. President Gilbert previously served as provost and vice president for academic affairs of Mississippi State University. Prior to that he served as head of the Department of Agricultural and Mechanical Engineering and coordinator for the biomedical engineering graduate program in the Bagley College of Business.

At Marshall University his goals and initiatives speak to his commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. His record of scholarship and a recognizable sense of civic awareness and public service. His accomplishments at Marshall University include his initiation and support of the Commission on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, the Commission on the Status of Women. His focus on scholarship at Marshall University has included his support of research and learning opportunities for MU students while emphasizing the importance of students working on projects that have worked to improve equity for women on campus.

His leadership of the Alliance for the Economic Development of Southern West Virginia was instrumental in the development of scholarship. His commitment to scholarship can best be summarized by his powerful statement which demonstrates his philosophy of scholarship: “At Marshall, we welcome and embrace all members of our university and local community regardless of their national origin, race, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, veteran status or disability. We believe that our university and it is an open access campus. In the context of an institution of higher learning, we have the hope that we can exchange ideas and points of view in a civil manner that will inform and educate us on issues when we do not agree. Dr. Gilbert’s goals for the future include increasing the enrollment of students, promoting research, and helping advance the state of West Virginia in terms of economic development.”

Rev. Blanks currently serves as the pastor of the Highland Avenue United Methodist Church in Fairmont, WV. He and his wife were recipients of the WVUMC One Matters Award in 2017. One of their ways of sharing is hosting their Annual Communal Picnic which provides an opportunity for the church to serve the community. Rev. Blanks' inspiration for this event is best summarized by his words: "It is a way to be present for the church. We always try to get out in our community as much as we possible can. The more we share our love, maybe that will be helpful to our "community".



Governor's Living the Dream –
The Embodiment of Dr. King's Vision and Legacy

Elliot G. Hicks, Esq.
Charleston, WV

or's Living the Dream Award is given to a person who best exemplifies all of the character of Dr. King: leadership, sharing of self, human and civil rights, and advocacy of peace. Elliot G. Hicks is a resident of Charleston, WV, was educated in Kanawha County and graduated from West Virginia University with a Juris Doctorate. Mr. Hicks is a long-time trial lawyer with extensive experience in litigation, including product liability, premises liability, corporate and commercial litigation, insurance law cases, personal injury, malpractice, and higher education law. He has over thirty-seven years of practice experience and has spent the majority of those years; thus his law practice has evolved to a primary focus on conducting mediation and arbitration. The balance of his legal practice is devoted to assisting clients with resolving cases without the need for a trial and for less money. His experience in trial law helps clients with finding resolutions to disputes through mediation and arbitration.

Over the course of his years of service to his profession and to his clients, he has served as President of the Kanawha County Bar Association, representative to the West Virginia State Bar Board of Governors, and the West Virginia State Bar. In 2009, appointed by Governor Joe Manchin in 2009, Mr. Hicks has served as the Chair of the Commission on the Future of the State of West Virginia and has chaired the Academic Policy Committee of the West Virginia Higher Education Commission.

Mr. Hicks' community activities include election to the Board of Directors of the West Virginia Humanities Council, a position he has held since 2015. He created a fundraising dinner in 2013 for retiring Professor Dr. James H. Hester, raising over \$33,000 in his honor toward the creation of the Innocence Project which provides legal representation for wrongfully convicted inmates. Other board appointments include the Legal Aid Society, Charleston Community Development Corporation, Kanawha County Housing and Redevelopment Authority, the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Charleston, Trustee Board for the First Baptist Church of Charleston Foundation, and the Charleston Jazz Series.

In addition to his professional complement to Mr. Hicks' varied professional and community obligations, he finds time for writing, research, and public speaking. He is a prolific writer and is passionate about matters of social justice. In short, he gives voice to the voiceless through his current columns and other publications. In the manner of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Mr. Hicks delivers inspiring and provocative speeches throughout the Kanawha Valley and beyond. He skillfully speaks truth to power.



2020 Living the Dream Award Nomination Form

Luther King, Jr. State Holiday Commission is now accepting names of persons and organizations for the "Living the Dream" awards. The awards will be presented on Monday, December 2, 2019, at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Observance.

Local awards, and up to three Service Organization awards will be given to those who best exemplify the qualities, and/or personal traits, the principles and ideals characterizing Dr. King in his pursuit of the American Dream.

Nomination categories and criteria are:

Category of Peace: A person who has been an advocate of social change in a non-violent way.

Category of Self: A person who has rendered service to others in the public or private sector.

Category of Human and Civil Rights: A person who has been actively involved in the pursuit of equality and justice, and has advocated for social change.

Category of Leadership: A person who has made significant contributions in the area of education.

Category of the Living the Dream Award: A person who best exemplifies all of the characteristics of leadership, sharing of self, human and civil rights, and advocacy of peace; with a recognized record of community awareness and public service.

Category of the Service Organization Honor Roll: Qualifying organizations must have demonstrated one or more of the principles for which Dr. King stood: the promotion of human and civil rights, providing services to underserved communities, promotion of tolerance, and resolving conflict in a nonviolent manner.

Nomination packets must include:

1. A typed statement (no more than one page) that discusses the qualities of the nominee and how the nominee best meets the standard of a specific award category.

2. A one-page biography with color picture of the candidate or mission statement/activities of the organization.

3. A newspaper article (e.g., newspaper articles) that describes the nominee's community involvement.

4. The award category in which your nominee is nominated.

5. All nomination packets submitted by USPS mail, e-mail and/or fax must have a post mark or date stamp no later than 5:00 p.m. on December 2, 2019.

Only complete (i.e., including nomination form and supporting documents) one nomination packet per nominee.
